From the President

I had the opportunity to attend an informal gathering of the presidents of Bay Area AAUW Branches on August 22. About 30 branch presidents and local AAUW leadership gathered in a home in Marin to hear some remarks from National AAUW CEO Kim Churches and to share issues and experiences. It was a very energizing meeting! Here are some of the key points that I want to pass along to our DAW membership:

- Our AAUW Mission to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy will increase in effectiveness and relevance by being the organization LEADER in our 3 strategic pillars: Education & Training, Economic Security, and Leadership. By focusing on these three areas (rather than trying to address every worthy issue related to women) we differentiate our organization, increasing our ability to attract members and donations.
- 2) Our biggest emphasis in the immediate future is the **online Work Smart program**, which is a learning tool for salary and promotion negotiation. *Please logon to this program to check it out, and pass the link on to your daughters, granddaughters, and everyone else who could benefit*. https://salary.aauw.org/
- 3) Transparency in AAUW finances: AAUW National is overfunded for our Scholarships and Grants (see Model). We have almost \$120 Million in *restricted funds that we cannot use* for the majority of our programs. Our *membership is encouraged to donate to non-restricted funds, especially the Greatest Needs Fund* https://www.aauw.org/resource/the-aauw-fund-fag/
- 4) AAUW National is seeking to expand our appeal to younger, more diverse demographic by focusing on advocacy and inclusivity. This moment in our political climate is optimum for moving in this direction. "The Equity Network" will be rolled out this year in test areas
- 5) Five Star Program celebrating branches that align efforts with AAUW strategic plan and mission https://www.aauw.org/resource/five-star-national-recognition-program/



Your 2019-20 executive board and committee chairs met on August 30 to set our goals and priorities for the coming year and ensure they are aligned and supportive of AAUW National Strategic Plan (We want Five Stars!!). Look for more in program invitations and in the next issue of *The Advocate*.

Public Policy Update

AAUW Initiatives and Efforts

Negotiating Salaries

AAUW has partnered with the New York City Economic Development Corporation (NYCEDC) to teach 10,000 women in the Big Apple how to negotiate for higher salaries and advocate for themselves at work. The initiative — called "Ask for more" — includes online training and, starting in the fall, a series of in-person workshops in the city's five boroughs. Plans are also under way to develop Spanishlanguage training and programs tailored to specific industries. Once fully implemented, Ask for More will be among the largest salary negotiation and women's leadership initiatives in the country, according to NYCEDC Since AAUW's launched its Work Smart salary-negotiation program in 2015, nearly 80,000 women have registered. Some participants have reported negotiating salaries up to 20% higher than the initial offer after taking the training. Women can sign up for the New York sessions at women.nyc/salary-negotiation

Pay equity

Since the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team (USWNT) crushed it in the Women's World Cup last month, the team has continued their off-the-field fight for fair pay. On August 1, Deborah J. Vagins, AAUW's Senior Vice President for Public Policy and Research, met with members of the team, actors Natalie Portman, America Ferrera and Brie Larson, and other advocates to talk about how to change pay equity policies, including by supporting the federal Paycheck Fairness Act. Governor Gavin Newsom will be looking at these educations related bills in October.
