

Learn about Public Policy

California Single-Payer Universal Healthcare Bill:

Assemblyman Ash Kalra sponsored AB 1400 would create CalCare — a single-payer health care plan that would cover everyone in the state — and an independent, nine-member CalCare Board to administer it.

That bill would impose a 2.3% excise tax on businesses making more than \$2 million in gross receipts per year, a 1.25% payroll tax on employers with 50 or more Californian employees, an additional 1% payroll tax on employees making more than \$49,900 per year, and a new marginal income tax on those making \$149,509 and above.

AB 1400 has been referred to the Appropriations Committee. Since it was introduced last year, the bill will die if it doesn't make it out of the Assembly by Jan. 31. For ACA 11 to take effect, it would have to be approved by a two-thirds majority in the Assembly and Senate, and then go on the ballot to and be approved by voters.

Final Stimulus Checks:

The final batch of stimulus payments from California is heading out in the mail. Families who earn less than \$75,000 and met other requirements will receive \$600 payments, plus an extra \$500 for dependents.

Build Back Better Summary: H.R.5376 — 117th Congress (2021-2022) Introduced in House (09/27/2021)



This bill provides funding, establishes programs, and otherwise modifies provisions relating to a broad array of areas, including education, labor, childcare, health care, taxes, immigration, and the environment. (The bill is commonly referred to as the Build Back Better Act.)

For example, the bill provides funding for management of the National Forest System; job placement and career services; safe drinking water, energy-efficiency, and weatherization projects; electric vehicles and zero-emission, heavy-duty vehicles; public health infrastructure and supply chain resiliency; housing, rental,

and homeowner assistance programs; cybersecurity programs; tribal infrastructure, housing, environmental, and health programs; wildfire prevention, drought relief, conservation efforts, and climate change research; small business assistance and development; transit services and clean energy projects in low-income communities; and infrastructure and administration of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Additionally, the bill establishes programs to provide up to six semesters of free community college, free childcare for children under the age of six, free universal preschool services, and health benefits for eligible individuals who reside in states that have not expanded Medicaid.

The bill also includes provisions that establish a methane fee for certain petroleum and natural gas facilities; expand Medicare to cover dental, hearing, and vision care; provide certain aliens with a path to permanent resident status (e.g., those who entered the United States as minors); provide up to 12 weeks of paid family and medical leave; restructure and increase the tax rates for certain corporations and high-income individuals (e.g., individuals with income over \$400,000); and require the Department of Health and Human Services to negotiate maximum prices for certain brand-name drugs under Medicare.

The bill did not pass the senate and is now under re-construction, to give it a better chance to pass once split into two components.

Childcare Relief:

Childcare relief remains the top priority of AAUW California this year. Please be sure to contact your Senator and let them know of your AAUW membership and your commitment to ensuring our Nation's future.



AAUW is calling on the 117th Congress to ensure that a permanent paid leave program, childcare funding and the Child Tax Credit are included in the budget reconciliation process.

"Women Finding Solutions" Recap

Three inspiring Bay Area women shared stories about their work promoting anti-racism during January's "Women Finding Solutions" evening.

Veronica Benjamin, a Danville native, became a voice for social justice following the killing of Tyrell Wilson. Veronica founded Conscious Contra Costa – to help make people aware of racial injustice and build more community spirit.



Tanya Earls moved to San Francisco from El Salvador when she was four, grew up living in the Mission district and eventually moved to San Ramon. Struck by the lack of black history and respect for black African culture in San Ramon schools, Earls wrote "Ancient Africa" to provide a new perspective that black culture began well before slaves were brought to the Americas.

Lori Watson grew up in a supportive black community in Mississippi. She first experienced racism when she moved to California which inspired to start her leading seminars about recognizing and addressing systemic racism. She encourages people to be uncomfortable and reach out to others.
