
Speaker: Dr. William Francis, MD, MSEM, BSEE, Emergency Medicine Physician

Start the new year by joining us for our monthly meeting on January 19, 2023, at 6:00 pm. After ½ hour of our usual social time, our guest speaker will be Dr. William Francis, Assistant Medical Director, Family Violence Prevention and Pediatrics, at the Sutter Delta Emergency Department in Antioch. His talk will be about emergency medicine in general, leading into specifically providing health care to women experiencing violence. He'll also tell us about the innovative TeleCARE program in Contra Costa which enables remote care for victims who may not be able to access in-person services.

In 2018 Dr. Francis began partnering with STAND! followed by the Family Justice Center and founded the TeleCARE program with the objective of providing accessible and free healthcare to all survivor of interpersonal violence and their families. Dr. Francis is a champion of interpersonal violence prevention, healthcare access and pediatric emergency services.

Join us for our Third Thursday Member Meeting on February 16 at 6:00 pm. In addition to our usual social time, we will have two guest speakers sharing their important work supporting youth who are transitioning out of foster care.

Roshawn Campbell will inform us about the Renaissance Scholars Program, founded in 2006, which aims to ensure that all former foster youth who enter CSUEB as undergraduate students complete their degree. This helps them to be successful in the next chapter of their lives. The program promotes the holistic development and graduation rates (70%!) of former foster youth attending CSU East Bay by providing comprehensive support services through collaboration with a variety of university departments and community organizations. This critical support includes access to housing, books, supplies, financial aid and counseling. To learn more about the Renaissance Scholars Program click here

Britt Wade's topic will be the Family Harvest Farm which is part of the John Muir Land Trust. Once a vacant lot, in 2020 this 3.5-acre parcel in Pittsburg was repurposed into a thriving organic farm. Its mission: to empower transitioning foster youth and adults to discover and participate in a local food system that encourages healthy living, nurtures the environment, and feeds the community. Family Harvest Farm employs transition-age foster youth in a hands-on job-readiness program, teaching marketable skills and preparing them for life outside the foster care system. As we look forward to our activities for advancing the AAUW mission this year, we've taken stock of our progress and plans in the five focus areas our board identified during our 2022-23 strategy session; look for the details in the article in this edition. We encourage you to send your ideas about how to expand or improve our approach in ways that are meaningful to you and will help us continue to advance gender equity for women.

An important accomplishment to note for our branch is finishing and approving updates to our Policies and Procedures in anticipation of becoming a 501(c)(3) organization. In addition to small updates that enable us to qualify to grant tax deductions to our donors, we also made a revision to allow our board to adjust geography and other eligibility requirements for our Local Scholarship applicants. This will give us the flexibility to direct one or more of our awards to students with financial need evidenced by their membership in a particular group. This year, on a trial basis, we plan to award one of our Local Scholarships to a student from the Renaissance Scholars program at Cal State East Bay. Renaissance Scholars are students who are transitioning out of foster care; you'll learn more about this program at our February Member Meeting. We are excited to explore this new opportunity to extend our scholarship program!

On a final note, look for a milestone in U.S. history and for women in prominent positions – for the first time you will be able to see two women's signatures gracing one and five dollar bills when they go into circulation this year. Both Janet Yellen, Treasury Secretary, and Lynn Malerba, U.S. Treasurer, provided their signatures to the Bureau of Engraving in December to be printed on newly minted bills.

They had a blast, they learned a lot and they already had plans for what to do next, maybe participating in similar programs, or even trying to give back to the community by volunteering with a program. Thanks to the contributions of many, we have made the procedures more current with our operations, including our use of email and shared online documents rather than hardcopies and snail mail. We have also reviewed and updated the links to helpful information on our California and National AAUW websites.

While is a lengthy document, it has very helpful information and you don't have to read the whole thing at one sitting! The way to use it is to do a search and go directly to the pages that contain the information you want to reference. For example, if you are interested in a particular position in our organization, you can find out more about that position including a detailed list of responsibilities, usually only one page.

Also exciting to report – we have updated the P&P and other governance documents as one of the first steps towards becoming a fully tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organization. This effort will enable contributions made to our branch to be tax deductible which will hopefully encourage more to contribute to our efforts to advance equity for women and girls in compensation, leadership, STEM, and education opportunities.

You Can Help with AAUW California's Gov Trek

Put More Women in Power! Be a Gov Trek Volunteer! On January 28, California AAUW will launch the Gov Trek program, targeting the shortage of women in political leadership roles by giving junior and senior high school-age girls a glimpse of careers in public service and elected office. During five, online, two-hour sessions, students will engage in interactive learning with exposure to women legislators, career options, and the inner workings of a political campaign. Comments Sandi Gabe, President, California AAUW: "We're honored to collaborate with California AAUW branches, education, government and community leaders to remove barriers to women in political leadership and increase access to public service jobs. We look forward to creating a more diverse government by building capacity and a pipeline of talent from female populations in California."

Gov Trek provides a terrific opportunity for us to act on our local branch priority to help *put more* women in power. We can volunteer as Zoom breakout room facilitators supporting the student participants. Facilitators will manage a group of up to 15 students in a Zoom breakout room, helping them stay on task, assisting with the understanding and implementation of assigned activities, and facilitating collaboration among the group for active participation. The two-hour sessions will be on Saturdays starting January 28.

Public Policy Legislative Update: CA Assembly Bill (AB) 2832, Whole Child Community Equity

Turning to our branch priority to make a difference in the area of <u>education equity</u>, I'll spotlight a piece of state legislation that was supported by California AAUW and signed into law by Governor Newsom on 9/29/22: <u>AB 2832</u>, <u>Whole Child Community Equity</u>.

AB 2832 establishes the End Racial and Economic Inequities in Childcare in California Initiative. The bill requires the California Department of Social Services (CDSS), in consultation with the California Department of Education (CDE), to develop the Whole Child Equity Framework and Whole Child Community Equity Screening Tool, and to finalize and present the Equity Framework, Equity Screening



Tool and their recommended uses to the state legislature by January 1, 2025. This bill also requires

CDSS to convene a stakeholder workgroup to provide recommendations for the development of the Framework and the Equity Tool.

According to the bill's author, Assemblymember Robert Rivas (CA Assembly District 29):

AB 2832 will help narrow the racial and socioeconomic gaps in our state's early childhood education (ECE) system by establishing a tool to identify the equity needs of our most underserved children. Currently, the state distributes ECE resources to local communities based on median income. While this is an essential factor, this method unfortunately does not account for multiple factors of need beyond poverty. To better capture the holistic needs of a child, this bill creates the Whole Child Community Equity Screening Tool, which outlines and examines data, including COVID-19 impacts, housing, health, and other categories to identify the highest-need communities across the state. Lastly, through a stakeholder input process, AB 2832 will provide recommendations to address inequities in the areas identified by the tool. By pinpointing need and investing in our most underserved, AB 2832 brings California one step closer to achieving educational equity for our youngest learners.

Of note: California AAUW's statement of support for AB 2832 was quoted in the bill analysis that served as background for the 5/26/22 Assembly full floor vote, which resulted in 74 ayes, 0 noes, and 4 abstentions.

I asked Julio Mendez Vargas, Legislative Aide to Assemblymember Rivas, about grassroots community group opportunities to help ensure effective, timely implementation of AB 2832. Mr. Mendez Vargas

indicated that Assemblymember Rivas will be following the progress of the state Department of Social Services and the state Department of Education as they move forward with implementation. There may be opportunities for AAUW CA members with early childhood expertise to participate in the stakeholder workgroup required by the bill, and/or to provide public comments to the workgroup. We'll stay tuned!

November 8th was a Good Day for Women! The election is finally over and overall, AAUW members can be pretty happy with the results. Here are a few highlights:

- One woman was added to each house of Congress: the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate, bringing the numbers to 124 (H) and 25 (S).
- Of the total of 149, 54 are women of color.
- With Nancy Pelosi stepping down as Speaker of the House, we lost the most powerful woman's
 voice in government, but still have a woman on the minority leadership team, Minority Whip
 Katherine Clark.
- Governors of 12 states are now women.
- 23% of all mayors across the nation are women, including our brand new and first woman mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass.
- 32 women won seats in the California Legislature (total confirmed 44, 3 pending)
- All executive positions in California except Governor are filled by women, including Secretary of State, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, and Controller.
- Proposition 1 prevailed and women's right to control their own reproductive choices is now enshrined in our constitution.

The state Public Policy Committee thanks each and every AAUW California member who voted, who assisted in our Voter Education (VE) campaign by spreading our messages on social media, who took the pledge to vote for Prop 1 (we had 437 sign up!), and who worked within their branches to do their own VE events.

On December 1st, I did a presentation for the California Online Branch on the election results. The recording of the presentation is posted on the website <a href="https://example.com/here/branch/new-appendix-new-

Next challenge: let's add California to that list of states with a woman governor! Together we can – and will – change the world!
