**Featured Speaker:** Tricia Grame, PhD Integral Studies, California Institute of Integral Studies in San Francisco



Join us for our Third Thursday Member Meeting on April 20. In addition to our usual social time, we will learn about the evolution of women's power and self-image expressed through the visual imagery of the female form in art.

From ancient fertility images to contemporary art, the female body has often been a focus of art works. Undoubtedly, these visuals have affected how we think, how we want to look, and what defines beauty. Tricia will trace the evolution and cultural impact of a few select famous paintings of the female body created by male artists throughout the history of art, including more current times when sexual imagery is used for the purpose of marketing, potentially damaging women's self-esteem and identity.

Today the visual imagery of the female form in art, advertising and media has changed drastically. After giving the background of past depictions of women in art, she will discuss women artists that inspire us and are dramatically changing the art world to no longer see women as art objects. Contemporary female artists have the freedom to use their own vision - from two and three dimensional to performance art - and they will leave their indelible, permanent mark in art history.

*Tricia Grame, Ph.D* moved from New York to California, where she pursued her education, earning a Teaching Credential, a Masters in Art Education and a Masters in Art History. She continued with graduate courses at the University of Berkeley, California College of the Arts, Oakland, and the California Institute of Integral Studies, San Francisco.

She's traveled extensively in Asia, Europe, and South America, and organizes yearly art educational tours to Europe and South America for students and adults. Her passion is creating two and three

dimensional art inspired by her research in Italy and Malta about ancient female symbols. She integrates natural materials with her subject matter and historical narrative into her art works. Her research and the art she creates is about the evolution of the images of the female form in art history, education and most importantly her enduring cultural impact on self-identity, gender roles, the validity of symbolism, the position of the female images in society and the fallacy of the Beauty Myth.

#### Public Policy Update

AAUW California reviewed the current state legislature bills and picked 3 to support and co-sponsor. These bills were presented to legislators on AAUW California's Lobby Day held on March 21 and 22.

Here is a short re-cap of the bills -

## AB1394 – authored by Assemblymember Buffy Wicks

This bill addresses the soaring rates of child sexual exploitation and sex trafficking by amending current law to hold social media platforms accountable to survivors.

It would allow victims of child sexual exploitation and trafficking to sue a social media platform for between \$1 million and \$5 million if the victim can prove the platform design knowingly, recklessly or negligently facilitated the use of code words for sexual predators to describe the type of child and the type of sexual activity that resulted in the act of exploitation.

## SB287 – authored by Senator Nancy Skinner

This bill would prohibit a social media platform from using a design, algorithm, or feature that the platform knows, or should know, causes child users to: purchase fentanyl; inflict harm on themselves or others; develop an eating disorder or engage in dangerous dieting; purposely take their own lives; and/or experience addiction to the social media platform. A victim of any of these consequences can sue the platform for up to \$250,000 for each violation.

# AB549 -co-authored by Assemblymember Rebecca Bauer-Kahn and Assemblymember Lisa Calderon

The convention on the elimination of all forms of discrimination against women referred to as CEDAW was an international treaty adopted in 1979 by the United Nation General assembly. It has been described as an international bill of women's rights. This bill requires all state agencies to conduct an evaluation of all their departments to ensure the state does not discriminate against women, and report their findings every 2 years and adopt the language of the CEDAW declaration of the UN in 1979 regarding equal opportunities for women.

## A History-Making Month for Women and Girls – A message from AAUW's CEO

Women's History Month is the perfect time to reflect on the progress we've made for generations. AAUW makes history every month through our programs, advocacy and philanthropy. As President Biden noted at the White House Women's History Month celebration, which I had the privilege to attend, "We reaffirm our commitment to advancing rights and opportunities for women and girls in the United States and around the world."

And so does AAUW. Visit our homepage to see just a few examples of the diverse women who have blazed trails in every field since AAUW's founding in 1881.

As we move into a busy spring, women's economic security remains our top policy priority. March's Equal Pay Day—where we noted all women workers made only 77% of all men's earnings in 2021 reinforced that we must push policymakers to pass the recently reintroduced Paycheck Fairness Act and take definitive action to relieve student-loan debt.

A few weeks ago, I was honored to represent AAUW at the 67th NGO Committee on the Status of Women Forum and UN Commission on the Status of Women (NGO CSW67). Our expert panel of fellowship recipients discussed ensuring women aren't left behind in tech fields and emphasized the urgency of closing the digital gender divide. Programs that engage curious teens—like AAUW's STEMEd for Girls—are part of the difference we're making today to build success for tomorrow.

**The Gender Pay Gap Is Alive And Not Well!** Big news this month is that National is changing its methodology and terminology in terms of discussing the gender pay gap. They are asking that we no

longer talk about it in terms of "the day that women 'catch up' to men," the feeling being that we will never catch up! They are asking that we focus on the size of the gap itself. They are providing statistics specifying that the gap for "all women vs all men for all full-time workers" = 84%; and for "all women vs all men for all workers, including parttime and seasonal" = 77%. These are the numbers that will be used for the "all women" Equal Pay Day date of March 14th. For all non-white women, the same measurement is being applied within that group and specific dates have been assigned. See <u>National's</u> <u>Equal Pay page</u> for percentages and dates.

Other big news: National has finally hired a new Public Policy Director. Her name is Meghan Kissell. She was the Public Policy Field Director in 2012-15.
