Eager visitors bought over 500 tickets for the tour, there were six generous sponsors, and a large contingent of branch volunteers and



friends helped to make it all possible. In addition to providing a lovely experience for all the visitors, the tour's over \$27,000 in proceeds will fully fund our branch's Local Scholarships for next year.

It was truly a community building effort by more than 70 volunteers - homeowners, sponsors, docents, and vendors - who created a beautiful, peaceful, and educational visit to five very different environments. At our post-tour celebratory meeting on May 18th, tour chair Bette Felton recognized all the areas where so many people contributed to the tour including —

Time to Renew Your Membership!

Renewals for current AAUW members are due on or before July 1st – so if you haven't already, it's time to do your renewal. Membership dues for the 2023-24 fiscal year have increased slightly as our Treasurer explained in last month's newsletter. *National dues* are \$72, of which \$69 is tax-deductible. *State dues* remain the same at \$20 and are not tax-deductible. Our *branch dues* are



now **\$28**. This means regular DAW branch members pay a **total of \$120** for regular National, State and Branch membership. If you're a *dual member* with another branch as the primary one, you'll owe just \$28 (branch only) and if you're a *paid life member*, you owe \$48 (state + branch).

There are three ways to renew:

- 1. **Renew Online:** Send your amount due using your credit card via <u>PayPal</u>. There is a convenience fee of \$4.91. If needed, please update your information here.
- 2. **Use AAUW National's Community Hub app:** Sign on to the National Community Hub and follow the instructions to renew online. (Note that our branch ID# is CA0154). There's no fee for paying with a credit card this way; to access the Hub click here.
- 3. **Renew by Mail:** Write your check for \$120, payable to Danville-Alamo-Walnut Creek AAUW, and mail to:

There's a **special bonus** if you renew by June 15th, and we have at least 100 renewals by then – we'll pick one lucky member to get a free membership at our Installation event on June 15th. So don't delay!


Public Policy Update

Response to book Bans:

PEN AMERICA V. ESCAMBIA COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT

PEN America, Penguin Random House, and a diverse group of authors joined with parents and students in



Escambia County, Florida, to file a federal lawsuit challenging removals and restrictions of books from school libraries that violate their rights to free speech and equal protection under the law. This lawsuit brings together authors whose books have been removed or restricted and parents and students in the district who cannot access the books, in a first of its kind challenge to unlawful censorship. Ensuring that students have access to books on a wide range of topics and that express a diversity of viewpoints is a core function of public education — preparing students to be thoughtful and engaged citizens.

The lawsuit says the Escambia County School District and School Board violated the First Amendment rights of the students, authors, and publishers by removing books "based on ideological objections to their contents or disagreement with their messages or themes."

The **bills on our AAUW California 2023-24 Legislative Agenda** are working their way through committee hearings. Here's the status -

AB 230, Passed to Senate 76 – 0 - Reyes — Changes to the Menstrual products: Menstrual Equity for All Act of 2021

AB 58, Passed to Senate 62 - 7 - Wicks — Paid family leave: eligibility: care for designated persons.

AB 524, Passed committee 12 – 3 - Wicks — Discrimination: family caregiver status.

AB 789, Passed committee 11 - 0 (Amended to take the reporting element out of the bill) -

Berman and Cervantes - Student financial aid: Cal Grants: satisfactory academic progress

AB 793, Passed committee 12 - 2 - Bonta — Privacy; Reverse Demands

AB 1054, Passed committee 15-0 - Berman — Pupil instruction: high schools: computer science education courses

AB 1057, Passed committee 15-0 - Weber — California Home Visiting Program

Farewell to the Tri-Valley Expanding Your Horizons (EYH) Conference

The Lawrence Livermore and Sandia National Laboratories consortium that manages the annual Tri-Valley EYH Conference has decided that they will no longer host the annual STEM event for girls. The wealth of STEM-oriented programs available in the Bay Area and challenges recruiting conference leadership and volunteers from the Labs has resulted in the Tri-Valley Conference being retired.

From the early days of the TVEYH Conference some 40 years ago, our branch and the Livermore-Pleasanton-Dublin branch have partnered with the National Labs in conducting the Tri-Valley EYH Conference. We have provided hundreds of event volunteers over the years who have served as workshop monitors and in other capacities. Our heartfelt thanks to Judy Lauper for her enthusiastic, committed service to the branch and the conference as our TVEYH lead and her recruitment and management of DAW volunteers each year.
