Third Thursday Member Meeting – April Recap

DEI (Diversity Equity & Inclusion): Gender 101

Our branch DEI Officer, Teresa Cheung, introduced the 3rd Thursday Member Meeting on April 18 with a summary of our DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) activities for this FY. The DEI committee has supported school board initiatives, debated and endorsed AAUW national actions, and informed members about techniques for encouraging DEI awareness and discussion.

The speakers for the evening, two key members of the local PFLAG organization - Taylor denBroeder and Elisa Tinker, then engaged the group of about 40 attendees with their enlightening presentation titled “Gender 101”. They started by familiarizing us with common terms and issues relating to LGBTQ+ people, which generated some lively discussion. Then they gave us guidance in understanding and supporting transgender and gender non-conforming individuals. They finished with some ideas on how to have a positive impact for the LGBTQ+ community, in particular to be a visible ally and to be aware of using inclusive terms like “people” rather than “men and women”.

AAUW Supports Transgender Women and Girls

Building on the theme of our April Member Meeting, we are highlighting an open letter written by GLAAD in support of transgender women and girls. This letter serves to raise awareness of issues regarding transgender rights and to denounce ongoing anti-transgender rhetoric and efforts. AAUW has joined a long list of organizations and notable people who have come together to stand with GLAAD in signing the letter.

The central message expressed is “We acknowledge with clarity and strength that transgender women are women and that transgender girls are girls. And we believe that honoring the diversity of women’s

experiences is a strength, not a detriment to the feminist cause. All of us deserve the same access, freedoms, and opportunities.”

Public Policy – Tax Measures

VOTE YES ON MEASURES E & F!

The DAW Board endorses a “yes” vote on both San Ramon Valley Unified School District (SRVUSD) Parcel Tax measures E & F. These measures support funding for our local public school district at current levels, which is important to address AAUW CA’s Public Policy Priority of supporting equal access to quality public education for all students. We advocate for public funding adequate to support a strong infrastructure and equitable access to resources, including technology.

Be sure to complete your ballot for this mail-in election that’s just for the two measures. Ballots can be dropped off at one of the 4 permanent ballot boxes in the district or taken to the post office and mailed without a stamp. Be aware that **all ballots must be postmarked by May 7th at 8pm**.

Parcel Tax E renews an existing 10-year parcel tax that is due to expire next year. The measure authorizes a \$144 per parcel tax per year, adjusted annually. There is a senior citizen exemption that is available by filling out an exemption request form.

Citizens have voted to support SRVUSD with this existing parcel tax since 2004. Renewal of this tax will:

- Attract and retain highly qualified teachers
- Support academic programs in science, technology, engineering, arts, math, reading and writing
- Prepare students for college and careers
- Maintain Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs

Parcel Tax F is a supplemental tax to replace the CA state funding sent to the district to help all students. It will provide supplemental funding at a rate of \$98 per parcel per year, with a senior citizen exemption available. This tax will:

- Address loss of additional state funding
- Support programs in reading and literacy for the youngest learners
- Provide support for students struggling to succeed academically
- Address student mental health needs
- Attract and retain qualified teachers to support students with special needs

Both parcel taxes must pass with a two-thirds vote. The DAW Board encourages all branch members to vote in support of these two important local school funding measures. If you have any questions about these upcoming measures, please contact Laurinda Ochoa at ochoalaurinda@gmail.com.

Local Scholarship Update

Local Scholarships for 2024 Are Wrapping Up

Our branch's Local Scholarship program has evolved this year; we now have three categories of scholarships for local students as follows:

- **AAUW DAW Community Local Scholarships** – This is our typical type of scholarship that's open to women who will be college juniors, seniors, or graduate students in the upcoming academic year.
- **AAUW DAW Renaissance Scholarships** – This category of scholarship was new last year and has been expanded to potentially more than one recipient this year. It's open to women who are participating in the California State University East Bay (CSUEB) Renaissance Scholars Program (RSP) for former foster youth. Students must be sophomores, juniors, or seniors at CSUEB or be graduating from CSUEB and entering graduate school in the upcoming academic year.
- **AAUW DAW Single Parent Scholarship** – This scholarship is new this year. It's open to any student who is a single parent enrolled at Diablo Valley College (DVC) and has completed at least 12 units. The application process and award selection are administered by the DVC Foundation with scholarship funds provided by our branch.

The deadlines for applications for our branch Local Scholarship program have passed. Now it's up to our Local Scholarship Committee to review the applications and recommend the recipients of our Community and Renaissance Scholarships to the DAW board. The Single Parent Scholarship will be awarded by DVC.


The Lift Up Public Schools Coalition Starts Off Strong!

Summit Recap

On the afternoon of April 13th, over one-hundred fifty enthusiastic volunteers attended the Lift Up Public Schools Summit (LUPS) at Rossmoor's event center. The event was held to inform people about the threats to our local public schools and strategize about how we can all work together to protect honest, equitable, quality public education for all students. Organizations supporting the LUPS coalition include PTA, AAUW, PFLAG, and local Democratic clubs; seventeen organizations participated at the event with resource tables and promotional information available for attendees. Among the many

attendees were students, parents, grandparents, teachers, Board of Education trustees, and community members. AAUW was well represented; over 20 members attended from DAW, Orinda-Moraga-Lafayette, and several other branches, and Ogie Strogatz, DAW Co-President, was one of the organizers.



The formal program started with presentations about attacks on public education from the national, regional, and local school district perspectives. Then a panel discussion followed that was moderated by Heidi Gatty, President of the Walnut Creek School District Board. The three panelists, a local high school senior, an Alameda County School District BOE trustee, and a parent volunteer for the Sunol Unified School Board Recall Committee, described their experiences in the Contra Costa and Alameda county school districts.

After the panel discussion, attendees were invited to break out into working groups and form school district-specific teams to share resources, volunteers, and strategies for the upcoming school district races in the November elections.

AAUW California Public Policy Update

AAUW California Public Policy Committee Sets 2024 Legislative Agenda

The Public Policy Committee met virtually over a weekend in early March to set AAUW California's 2024 Legislative Agenda. Through a day and a half of discussions, we reviewed 67 bills, considering their merits and potential costs as well as their alignment with our public policy priorities. Then, we went through a voting/ranking process to select the top bills that we will advance as our Legislative Agenda. Our legislative agenda consists of three "A" priority bills, four "B" priority bills, twenty-nine "C" priority bills, and twelve spot bills that we are watching. Seven of the bills on our legislative agenda are 2-year bills that carried over from last year. All of the bills on our agenda fall under at least one of our four Public Policy Priority pillars; one bill - AB 2349 - falls under three pillars.

Excitingly, our signature “A” priority bill AB 2843 “Health Care Coverage for Rape and Sexual Assault Survivors” was authored by AAUW California. The bill is sponsored by AAUW California and falls under two of our Public Policy Priorities, “Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society” and “Economic Security for All Women”. The bill eliminates cost-sharing, including deductibles, from being imposed on any rape survivor seeking medical care following a rape. Insurers will be required to cover the cost of medical care with no copay. AB 2843 ensures that those individuals who wish to report a rape and file charges will have the benefit of a rape kit test and forensic exam to provide evidence to secure more convictions for acts of sexual violence. In addition, they can receive the care they need following a traumatic sexual attack. (See the [Lobby Days Talking Points](#) and [Bill Text](#) for more details.)

Our second “A” priority bill, AB 2326 “Title IX Oversight and Compliance Act”, is also sponsored by AAUW California. This bill falls under our Public Policy Priorities pillar “Equal Access to Quality Education for All Students” and champions something that AAUW California has long supported: Title IX enforcement. AB 2326 requires the Chancellors of the Community Colleges and State Universities and the President of the University of California to provide an annual report of their compliance with Title IX, with the report to be presented publicly and orally to the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Higher Education Finance, a move to hold the systems, and their leaders, more publicly accountable.

While we are listing AB 2326 as an “A” priority bill, a large number of Title IX related bills were introduced this year, likely prompted by the 2023 State Auditor’s report [Report 2022-109 \(ca.gov\)](#) which concluded that the CSU system’s handling of Title IX-related complaints has not adequately addressed allegations of inequity, harassment, and sexual harassment. While a great deal of the introduced Title IX legislation has not yet fully taken shape, we are watching them, as they will potentially become priority bills. In addition, one of the more fully-formed bills, AB 1790, is listed as a “B” priority bill on our agenda.

Our third “A” priority bill is AB 2099, “Protecting Reproductive Health Clinics”. This bill falls under our Public Policy Priorities pillar “Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society”. The bill makes it possible for the D.A. to file a felony charge for sharing personal information or images of individuals such as reproductive health care providers or patients, with the intent of causing harm or violence against them, if the posting and subsequent action results in bodily injury. With [violence against abortion providers continuing to rise following the reversal of Roe](#), the protection of providers and patients is now more important than ever.

DAW Branch Dues Are Now Tax Deductible

In the past year, our branch has become a 501(c)(3) organization as we focus on education and advocacy, rather than the potential political activity of our old 501(c)(4) organization. This transition means that any donation to our branch is now tax deductible, including your branch dues. The result is \$97 is now tax deductible of your total annual dues of \$120. Here's the breakdown:

| Your Dues Go To | Type of Organization | Amount Paid | Tax Deductible Amount |
|-----------------------------|--|--------------|-----------------------|
| National Dues (\$3 for PAC) | 501(c)(3) but \$3 goes to AAUW 501(c)(4) PAC | \$72 | \$69 |
