President's Message

I trust everyone who is a member of AAUW is engaged in our elections, making informed choices and using the information from forums and reliable media sources to vote with our heads and hearts. While I was traveling in the Owens Valley last month, we visited Manzanar, one of the Japanese internment camps used during WWII, to our country's shame. At the museum (which I highly recommend visiting) I encountered this quote from Charles Evans Hughes, who was Chief Justice of the US Supreme Court from 1930-1941. This statement is as valid today, perhaps even more so, than it was when Chief Justice Hughes expressed it:



"You may think that the Constitution is your security – it is nothing but a piece of paper... it is nothing at all, unless you have sound and uncorrupted public opinion."

This speaks directly to our mission and values as members of AAUW – to identify, publicize and offer education opportunities for ourselves and for all in our communities, so as to ensure sound and informed opinions and actions.

DAW Endorses Measure Q – Funds for SRVUSD

The AAUW DAW board has voted to add the branch to the list of organizations in favor of Measure Q. This endorsement is in line with our public policy goal of advocating for equal access to quality public education for all students.

The passage of Measure Q would renew for nine more years the expiring \$144 parcel tax that currently provides funds for San Ramon Valley Unified School District. Since it renews a current tax, it is NOT a new tax, and senior property owners can file for an exemption. As with the expiring parcel tax, the funds would be overseen by an independent citizens' oversight committee, be required to have formal annual audits, and will have public disclosure of all spending.

Measure Q funds would serve to retain teachers, and protect STEM and reading arts programs. None of the money would go to administrator salaries or benefits, and the measure does not have the built-in inflation increases that were in Measure D that failed to pass earlier this year.

AAUW DAW encourages everyone to vote "yes" on Measure Q to ensure continued funding for SRVUSD!

DAW Branch's October 2024 School Board Candidate Forums

A team from our DAW branch worked together with local groups of the League of Women Voters, the PTA, and with our neighboring branch, AAUW San Ramon, to plan three non-partisan school board candidate forums for the San Ramon Valley Unified School District (SRVUSD) and the Acalanes Union High School District (AUHSD). The sessions were held in October and were moderated by the League of Women Voters. They were a great opportunity to meet the candidates and hear directly from them about their positions on critical issues facing the school districts.

We certainly have many different worthy groups appealing for our money - why give to DAW?

As an AAUW member, we know you support our organization's mission of advancing equity for women and girls. And you are probably aware of our branch's signature programs that deliver on this mission; these programs rely completely on funds from donations and fundraising. One of the primary branch programs is to offer **Local Scholarships** to women in our area to advance their college education. We were able to award 10 scholarships of \$2,000 each in June, 2024. The second key branch program is to fund middle-school girls' participation in **Tech Trek**, a week-long STEM focused summer camp. With generous donations and fundraising, we sent 13 girls to in-person and virtual camps in 2024. In addition, DAW holds **meetings about topics related to our mission** to help inform members and the public. We've held eight interesting and topical meetings since the beginning of this year. Finally, DAW supports branch projects advancing equity for all.

Your member dues mostly go to help AAUW National, which has built a respected, visible national and international presence to further work for women's equity. The small portion of dues alloted to DAW enables us to keep in operation; just barely so.

Any amount that you are able to donate to DAW will go directly and entirely to our programs; it won't be used for day-to-day operations, and there's no administrative overhead since the branch is a totally

volunteer organization. You can be sure that contributions will be used solely for the desired program if you direct us accordingly. However, we suggest that DAW donations be made to our "Community Mission Projects" so they can be used for the area with the most need, which varies since fundraising can be unpredictable.

Each DAW Branch member received our annual letter in the past few weeks requesting donations to branch initiatives and the AAUW National Fund. It has directions for donating either online or by check.

Announcing the 2024-2025 Local Scholarships

The scholarship application forms have been updated, the latest instructions have been posted, and all three categories of scholarships are now open and accepting applications. The Local Scholarship Committee is off and running. Committee members include Ann Willoughby (Co-Chair), Holly Sauer (Co-Chair), Dot Healy, Judy Lauper, Ogie Strogatz, Kate Waters, and Monika Witte. If you are interested in joining the team, contact Ann or Holly.

DAW's scholarship program for 2024-2025 includes the same three categories from last year:

Community Local Scholarships – Awarded at a minimum of \$2,000 each, these scholarships are offered to individuals who identify as women and who currently live or work in Danville, Alamo, or Walnut Creek or who attended high school in one of these locations. Applicants must be juniors, seniors, or graduate students at an accredited college or university in the fall of 2025.

Renaissance Scholarships – Awarded at a minimum of \$2,000 each, these scholarships are offered to individuals who identify as women attending California State University East Bay (CSUEB) and who participate in the CSUEB Renaissance Scholars Program for former foster youth. Applicants must be sophomores or higher or graduate students in the fall of 2025.

Single-Parent Scholarship – DAW funds one scholarship of \$2,000 that is offered to any student at Diablo Valley College (DVC) who is a single parent and has completed a minimum of 12 college units. The scholarship is administered by DVC, and the college selects the awardee based on criteria established by DAW.

There are a couple of important changes to our scholarship program this year that were approved by the DAW Board. Consistent with AAUW's mission of equity for all and our branch's commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, Community Local Scholarships and Renaissance Scholarships will now be open to individuals who identify as women, not just

women. We have also expanded Community Local Scholarships to include individuals who work in Danville, Alamo, or Walnut Creek since these individuals are valuable, contributing members of our communities.

Mary Cassatt (1844–1926) was among the leading figures of the French Impressionist movement and the most celebrated woman artist of her era. Too often dismissed as a sentimental painter of mothers and children, Cassatt was in fact a bold modernist pioneer and an aesthetically radical painter, pastelist, and printmaker. *Mary Cassatt at Work* is the first North American retrospective of Cassatt's work in 25 years and includes works from the National Gallery of Art, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, as well as the Fine Arts Museums of SF.

Cost: Members of the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco are free and can bring a guest at no additional charge. If you are a member, please include your membership number in your email to me! Adults: \$35 Seniors (65+): \$32. If we have 10 or more, adults would be \$28 and seniors would be \$25. Audio players to the exhibit are an additional \$6. Volunteer with Quest at the Danville Pop-Up Museum

A Veteran's Day Pop-Up Museum related to space, robotics, science, and the military will be held on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday, November 9-11, at the Veteran's Memorial Building in downtown Danville. This is a free, family-friendly event that draws hundreds of attendees each day that's hosted by the Veteran's Memorial Building of the San Ramon Valley and the Town of Danville.

The Quest Science Center will have an interactive, hands-on exhibit at the event that features a simple-to-operate wind voyager tunnel. Visitors of all ages will have fun making and testing parachutes in the wind tunnel.

Quest needs volunteers aged 18 and up to help staff its exhibit for the Pop-Up Museum all three days from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. Shift times are flexible and can be two to three hours; you can volunteer by yourself or with a partner. Note that you will be standing for most of the shift. Simple instructions will be provided - no STEM-experience necessary.
